Plymouth, March 23.—This morning, between twelve and one o'clock, the towns of Plymouth and Dock were alarmed by the fire-bell of the Dock-yard, and the fire-bell of Plymouth Guildhall, ringing the alarm of fire : presently the drums of the garrison beat to arms, and the troops marched towards Dock., It was soon discovered that it was the Captain, 74, (hulk) on fire from stern to stern, in Hamoaze. She burnt so fiercely, that it was found necessary to cut loose from her the San Josef, 110, part of whole rigging was on board the Captain. It was also necessary, as the engines could not play from the Jetties to any advantage, to put some carronades and long 12-pounder field-pieces into launches and surround her, then, by firing into her between wind and water, to sink her ; being nearly consumed, she soon sunk, providentially without doing any other damage. The Queen Charlotte, 110 , and several other men of war, were near her, but dropt down the harbour out of reach of her line of fire. We are happy to state no lives were lost, and only three of the San Josef's cables destroyed. It was a fortunate business that the weather was mild and no wind up, and it is rather remarkable in the issue of events, that the San Josef was the ship that the late lamented Nelson boarded and took possession of on the glorious 14th of Feb. 1797, when Commander of the Captain.
